

EXPLANATION OF OUR PASTORAL PLAN

Dear Parishioners,

Opposite is the Christ in You Pastoral Plan. It is a very short document that indicates five main areas of our parish life. Each area has an inspiring quote from St Paul's Letter to the Colossians and makes a brief statement about its connected pastoral goals. The Pastoral Plan will be published on Pentecost Sunday, the great day of the Spirit's outpouring on all nations and the birth of the Church's mission to all the peoples of the earth. By Baptism and Confirmation we are empowered to play our part in that mission.

The plan is short so that it may be accessible and easily given to others. It is a missionary document to be made readily available to family, friends, and all those we meet and may be interested to know who we are and how we commit ourselves to live and serve. It will be printed so that it can fit into a person's hand.

Each of the five areas of the Pastoral Plan has a more specific list of practical goals (strategies) to bring the main pastoral goals to life. They will be published in the Bulletin for your reflection and suggestions over the first five weeks of Lent:

- Community Life Strategies 1st Sunday of Lent, 18/2
- Worship Strategies 2nd Sunday of Lent , 25/2
- Mission Strategies 3rd Sunday of Lent, 3/3
- Stewardship Strategies 4th Sunday of Lent, 10/3
- Parish Support Strategies 5th Sunday of Lent, 17/3

THIS WEEK'S READINGS & COMMENTARY

Entrance Antiphon

Psalm 94:6-7

O come, let us worship God and bow low before the God who made us, for he is the Lord our God.

First Reading

Job 7:1-4. 6-7

A reading from the book of Job

I am filled with sorrow all day long.

Job began to speak:

Is not man's life on earth nothing more than pressed service, his time no better than hired drudgery? Like the slave, sighing for the shade, or the workman with no thought but his wages, months of delusion I have assigned to me, nothing for my own but nights of grief. Lying in bed I wonder, 'When will it be day?' Risen I think, 'How slowly evening comes!' Restlessly I fret till twilight falls. Swifter than a weaver's shuttle my days have passed, and vanished, leaving no hope behind. Remember that my life is but a breath, and that my eyes will never again see joy.

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 146:1-6. R. v.3

(R.) Praise the Lord who heals the broken-hearted.

- 1. Praise the Lord for he is good; sing to our God for he is loving: to him our praise is due. (R.)
- 2. The Lord builds up Jerusalem and brings back Israel's exiles, he heals the broken-hearted, he binds up all their wounds. He fixes the number of the stars; he calls each one by its name. (R.)
- 3. Our Lord is great and almighty; his wisdom can never be measured. The Lord raises the lowly; he humbles the wicked to the dust. (R.)

Second Reading

1 Corinthians 9:16-19. 22-23

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

Punishment will come to me if I do not preach the Gospel. I do not boast of preaching the gospel, since it is a duty which has been laid on me; I should be punished if I did not preach it! If I had chosen this work myself, I might have been paid for it, but as I have not, it is a responsibility which has been put into my hands. Do you know what my reward is? It is this: in my preaching, to be able to offer the Good News free, and not insist on the rights which the gospel gives me.

So though I am not a slave of any man I have made myself the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could. For the weak I made myself weak. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessings.

Gospel

Mark 1:29-39

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark

He cured many who suffered from diseases of one kind or another.

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them.

That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

Communion Antiphon

Cf Psalm 106:8-9

Let them thank the Lord for his mercy. his wonders for the children of men, for he satisfies the thirsty soul, and the hungry he fills with good things.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate The Divine Touch

The mother-in-law of Simon (Peter) was sick in bed with a raging fever. When Jesus learned about her distressed state, he 'took her by the hand and helped her up'. He broke the taboo about physical contact with a woman not his relative because he wanted to holistically heal her dis-ease.

Simon's mother-in-law didn't need an aspirin and a cup of tea. She felt quarantined, isolated, and needed a hand reassuring her of sociable relationships. Jesus overcame her fever and her dis-ease with the world.

At every Mass we exchange a physical gesture at the greeting of Peace. This quite often overcomes being ill-at-ease with a family member or just with the neighbour in the pew. We need to take that symbolic action into the world. For somebody, it may be the most touching thing we ever do.

We could pause for a moment to identify that person who needs us to reach out, to take their hand and help them up.

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
