GOD THE NOURISHER

PASTORAL PLAN UPDATE

Dear Parishioners,

Our Pastoral and Finance Councils recently had a joint meeting to discern the next steps in developing the Parish Pastoral Plan.



Having read the contributions of parishioners on the community, liturgical, mission, staff, and property aspects of our parish life, we entered a time of reflection on the parish logos about the Light of Christ and Christ's Presence among us.

During our joint meeting we discussed some key words and insights to act as a basis to forming our pastoral goals. The word that struck me as I listened to the discussion was "nourish". This is a word that reaches deep into the psyche of our Church. In Sacred Scripture God is a nourisher and we are called to nourish others.

For example, in the Psalms we have a rich presentation of God's service of nourishing. God entrusts us for nourishment to our mother's breast (Psalm 22.9). God prepares a table for us (Psalm 24.5). We are invited to taste and see that God is good (Psalm 35.8). The children of Adam and Eve feast on the bounty of God's house and drink from the delightful streams of the Divine goodness (Psalm 36.8).

Jesus, the Son of the Living God, takes time and care to nourish others. He provides plentiful wine for the Wedding Feast at Cana (John 2.1-12). Out of compassion for the crowd of thousands Jesus multiplies the loaves and fishes to feed and strengthen them for their journey (Matthew 14.13-21; 15.32-38). Jesus, the living bread, gives himself as food and drink to us in the Eucharist to sustain us as we journey to the Banquet of Heaven (John 6.51; Matthew 26.26-29).

As members of God's People, hoping to one day enter eternal life, we feel the call to give water to the thirsty and feed the hungry (Matthew 25.35). We are very conscious that what we do to those in need we do to Jesus (Matthew 25.40). Such is the importance of each person in his or her need to be fed.

How can we nourish others in our community and those who are welcomed into our community? How do we help them to grow, nourishing them with the Word of God's Love, supporting them in times of trial, making them feel connected in conversation, raising their hearts in beautiful liturgical celebrations?

The discussion of the Pastoral and Finance Councils will continue over the next few months. When I return from my sabbatical we will take the next step in articulating our parish goals and communicate them for your reflection and comment in the new year.



CARE OF THE VULNERABLE

This Sunday we honour Safeguarding Sunday in which we seek to develop a culture of care and protection, especially for children and other vulnerable persons. This is a necessary aspect of our spirituality of welcome and service for those in our parish and Diocesan community. It is an expression of our love for family life and all ages and stages of our parishioners' lives.

In his Apostolic Letter On the Protection of Minors and Vulnerable Persons (26 March 2019), Pope Francis wrote:

"The protection of minors and vulnerable persons is an integral part of the Gospel message that the Church and all its members are called to proclaim throughout the world. Christ himself, in fact, has entrusted us with the care and protection of the weakest and defenceless: "whoever receives one child such as this in my name receives me" (Mt 18:5). Therefore, we all have the duty to welcome openheartedly minors and vulnerable persons and to create a safe environment for them, with their interests as a priority. This requires a continuous and profound conversion, in which personal holiness and moral commitment come together to promote the credibility of the Gospel proclamation and to renew the educational mission of the Church."

The Catholic Church is deeply committed to do everything possible to keep children and young people secure and supports National Child Protection Week. Jesus taught that in receiving children and those in need we receive and love him. Therefore, it is imperative that we seek to act with respect for them.

THIS WEEK'S READINGS & COMMENTARY

Entrance Antiphon

Psalm 118:137, 124

You are just, O Lord, and your judgement is right; treat your servant in accord with your merciful love.

First Reading

Ezekiel 33:7-9

A reading from the prophet Ezekiel

If you have not warned the wicked man, then I will hold you responsible for his death.

The word of the Lord was addressed to me as follows, 'Son of man, I have appointed you as sentry to the House of Israel. When you hear a word from my mouth, warn them in my name. If I say to a wicked man: Wicked wretch, you are to die, and you do not speak to warn the wicked man to renounce his ways, then he shall die for his sin, but I will hold you responsible for his death. If, however, you do warn a wicked man to renounce his ways and repent, and he does not repent, then he shall die for his sin, but you yourself will have saved your life.'

Matthew 18:15-20

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

If your brother or sister listens to you, you will have won that person back.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'If your brother does something wrong, go and have it out with him alone, between your two selves. If he listens to you, you have won back your brother. If he does not listen, take one or two others with you: the evidence of two or three witnesses is required to sustain any charge. But if he refuses to listen to these, report it to the community; and if he refuses to listen to the community, treat him like a pagan or a tax collector.

'I tell you solemnly, whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.

'I tell you solemnly once again, if two of you on earth agree to ask anything at all, it will be granted to you by my Father in heaven. For where two or three meet in my name, I shall be there with them.'

Communion Antiphon

Cf Psalm 41:2-3

Like the deer that yearns for running streams, so my soul is yearning for you, my God; my soul is thirsting for God, the living God.

REFLECTION by Fr Michael Tate **Boundaries and Juries**

Our Lord acknowledged that the community he was establishing had to set boundaries. Who is to decide who is within or outside those boundaries?

In today's Gospel, Our Lord teaches that a nuanced step by step process should be invoked. First, there is private conversation, then slightly extended to bring in two or three others, then a sort of church community jury before a person is put beyond the pale. Our Lord promises to be with them to help guide their decision. We all know of marriages which are fractured and where one partner has found intimacy and security in a second (civil) marriage. Pope Francis has not suggested that the second marriage be regarded as valid. But he has suggested a process of discernment to allow a divorced person to receive 'the Eucharist . . . a powerful medicine and nourishment for the weak.'

Could a jury of ordinary Catholic lay people help make that discerning judgement, and then advise the Bishop as to the next step? We could pause for a moment to ponder the promise: 'Where two or three are gathered into my name, I am there with them.'
